



CAST[®] STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

CAST continued to implement pieces of the 2016–2020 CAST Strategic Plan throughout 2017. Listed below are some examples of progress in 2017:

- Four Strategic Plan Implementation Teams were established, corresponding to the four areas depicted in the graphic at right. Each team was composed of a representative from each of the three work groups as well as a support member from the CAST office.
- A "Submit an Idea" button was added to the front of the CAST web page. This button enables anyone who views the web page to easily send a publication idea to CAST.
- Kylie Peterson, a recent Iowa State University graduate, was hired to expand the use of social media and help with CAST communications.
 A project prioritization order was established



throughout the work groups and the CAST Board of Directors. Twice a year, the work groups decide on priorities regarding their own publications and the directors mesh those work group rankings along with their own to create an overall priority list of current "in the works" publications.



BORLAUG CAST COMMUNICATION AWARD

Dr. Jayson Lusk, Distinguished Professor and head of the Department of Agricultural Economics at Purdue University, was announced as the recipient of the 2017 Borlaug CAST Communication Award (BCCA) at the World Bank in Washington, D.C., on April 27. CAST

and Syngenta hosted the event, an afternoon that began with a presentation from 2016 BCCA winner Dr. Kevin Folta titled *Earn Trust Before Facts Can Flow*.

A consummate communicator who promotes agricultural science and technology in the public arena, Lusk uses multiple forms of media to advocate for science. As he explains how innovation and growth are critical for food security and global process, Lusk uses articles, editorials, and a popular blog to take complicated issues and make them more accessible to all.

On October 18, Dr. Lusk was honored at a World Food Prize side event where he gave a memorable keynote address: *The Future of Food*. After a breakfast sponsored by Syngenta, the session began with short remarks by CAST Executive Vice President Kent Schescke, World Food Prize President Kenneth Quinn, and Syngenta's Dirk Drost. Julie Borlaug Larson, of the Norman E. Borlaug Institute for International Agriculture, spoke about her grandfather's legacy and his connections with CAST. Dr. Helen Jensen of Iowa State University formally introduced the award recipient.

After the Borlaug CAST Communication Award sculpture was handed to Jayson Lusk, he began his speech by pointing out that he wanted to prove "an ag economist can be an effective and stimulating communicator." He spoke of the need to consider an emerging food movement and how to engage consumers who mistrust tech and innovation. In an address that included facts and surveys, Lusk stressed the importance of engaging consumers and considering their values when communicating with the public.

Lusk's colleagues praise him for his abilities to reach audiences outside the agricultural community and for his willingness to engage in controversial food issues. He believes farmers, policymakers, and consumers need credible information to make informed decisions—he specifically wants an informed public to know more about important research by land-grant university students.

Following Lusk's speech, the American Society of Agricultural and Biological Engineers (ASABE) organized a presentation and panel discussion—*Designing the Road out of Poverty: Ensuring Resource Access.* Dr. Stephen Searcy (Texas A&M professor and ASABE president) introduced the session. Moderated by Indrajeet Chaubey (Purdue), the panelists included David Baltensperger (Texas A&M), Margaret Catley-Carlson (World Food Prize Committee), Geoff Graham (DuPont Pioneer), Timothy Williams (International Water Management Institute), and Jayson Lusk. The gathering ended with a Q & A session, providing each speaker with an opportunity to provide specifics about what works best for sustainable food production.




